Urban explorers rejoice: Toronto Free Gallery's Vacant Lots exhibition features 20 installations and performances in empty expanses across the city. Michael Brown's Leslie Spit Wall No. 2 is a eight-metre wall handmade from the bricks that are regularly dumped along this man-made peninsula. Also in the east end: Veronica Verkley's Urban Planning for Animals, for which ingeniously camouflaged woodland creatures are made out of the surrounding overgrowth. And, perhaps taking a cue from Wade, Samantha Crowhurst's and Leah Sandals' Just-Add-Water is a portable wading-pool kit alongside which the artists will discuss their strategy of "instant public-spacification." www.torontofreegallery.org
